Building a stronger Congo through higher education

Growing computer science department at Congo Protestant University (UPC)



n response to strong demand, UPC established a computer science department in 2017—the Faculty of Information Sciences (FASI). That first year over 300 students enrolled!

More women joining the ranks

Every year, more and more women are applying. This year 30% of first-year students enrolled are women.

Students hail from many different educational backgrounds—ranging from math and chemistry to teaching and literature.

More applicants than space available

Last term, after culling from 700 applicants who took the entrance exam, FASI was only able to accept 396 new students due to space limitations.

Unfortunately, lack of funds for tuition have subsequently forced 47 of first-year students to become "inactive." If they can afford tuition next year, they will be able to re-enroll in the program. On average 10–15% of new students must drop out due to financial pressures.

Highly motivated students

Very few fail scholastically. The attrition

New fund for women in computer science

Education Congo offers scholarships in specific areas of study through "named funds" that pay out every year once they reach maturity at US\$25,000.

Our newest fund, "Sanichas IT," has a starting balance of US\$5,000. It will provide scholarships to Congolese women in computer science. <u>Click here to help bring this fund to maturity</u>.

"Sanichas IT" is in memory of Evadne Sanichas, the daughter of a US Air Force pilot stationed in DRC 1965–1967. She attended the American School of Kinshasa, then a few years later was in the elite group of women first admitted to Yale University, where she majored in Philosophy. She later attended law school in California, then was a fellow at Georgetown International Law Center.

Evadne spent 30 years as a US government trial attorney defending against large-scale lawsuits by government contractors.

She was a pioneer in using computer technology to track large volumes of information for complex litigation.



UPC students attend **AFMED** conference

Last November, 20 UPC medical students were able to attend the University of Kinshasa AFMED conference thanks to financial support from Education Congo. The conference reunites medical scholars and practitioners who graduated from Congolese universities, but who have found work throughout the country and abroad.

This association of medical professionals informs, teaches and inspires our UPC students and their professors. In Congo, where the possibility of connections with medical professionals is scant, UPC medical students were able to hear and talk to their elders who have dedicated their lives to the pursuit of the biological sciences and service to those in need.

Fundraising results

Education Congo's December 2023 appeal for donations focused on "The Congo in your cellphone." It correlated our daily use of electronic equipment like cellphones and computers with the negative impact of mineral extraction on the Congolese.

In response to that reality, Education Congo partners with the Evangelical University of Africa (Bukavu) and the Protestant University of Congo (Kinshasa) to provide quality postsecondary education for Congolese students so they are equipped with the skill sets and expertise needed to help build a more just Congo that can reduce instability and exploitation.

We hoped to raise \$10,000 in December but supporters came through with over \$18,260.

FASI partners with many employers to place students in internships. Special events and programs also facilitate matching students with employers.

FASI leadership and faculty

FASI is well staffed with two full-time professors and 28 more professors pulled from other departments at UPC as well as from other universities in Kinshasa. Four of these professors are women.

The Dean of FASI, Prof. David Kutangila, received his PhD in Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence at the University of Granada in Spain in 2005.

Outstanding investment in the future of the Congo

A Congolese benefactor has funded the construction of a new building for FASI. When it is complete, it will provide much-needed classroom space for 1st and 2nd year students.
